Flying for the Festival

Sunday 14th May 2023 and inspired by their desire to make a difference, the above crew attended a thrilling charity zipline event to raise funds for the Festival. Little did they know that their endeavours would test their courage, create fantastic memories and help to raise some £25,000 for Charity. The event took place in Wales at ZipWorld, where the world's fastest Zipline, "Velocity2" resides. Once details of the zipline were published, word quickly spread throughout East Lancashire, and people from all walks of life eagerly signed up to participate. It was only a short time later that a group of forty-eight remarkable individuals assembled.

Among the participants was the Provincial Grand Master of East Lancashire, Robert Frankl, who managed to swap his usual PGM's Apron for a less fancy Zipline apron; accompanying him were two Assistant Provincial Grand Masters, Mark Davis & David McGurty. Some less-abled members also participated in the event, and they jumped right in without hesitation; taking the plunge with everyone else.

The zipline, stretched dauntingly across the old quarry. In groups of four the participants set off, soaring through the air with exhilaration; their screams of joy and muffled curse words echoed across the quarry as they hit over 100mph. Participants each enjoyed their moment of triumph as the onlookers, friends, and family cheered from below. As the last person touched down on the other side of the valley, the participants couldn't help but feel a sense of accomplishment. They had experienced an adrenaline-fueled adventure and raised incredible money for



charity. Afterwards, the participants all congregated at Bangor Masonic Hall where the Provincial Grand Master expressed his sincere thanks to all who organised, took part in the event or came to support.

The MCF is unique in that it does not raise money from the public. Its work is entirely funded through the generous donations of Freemasons, their families and friends. Approximately 40% of this funding is from the Festival system. There are currently 25 Provinces in Festival mode



Happy 7th Birthday to the MCF

This year the MCF celebrates 7 years since its formation in 2016, from an amalgamation of the previous Four masonic charities—the Grand Charity, the Masonic Samaritan Fund, the Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys and the **Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution. This**



Amalgamation has been successful with there now being one combined masonic support department. Most of the masonic work within the Province is administered by the East Lancashire Masonic Charity (ELMC) working in conjunction with the Provincial Grand Almoner and his team of Provincial Welfare Officers. The ELMC has its own Benevolence Committee which alongside the MCF further gives support to our Beneficiaries. Indeed the core functions of both the MCF and the ELMC are focused on the welfare of Freemasons and their Families.

In addition the MCF gives Grants to other Charities that operate within the core aims of the Charity. Such support includes grants aimed at reducing loneliness and isolation in later life and supporting the needs of disadvantaged and young people to help offer them the best start in life. There are 7 Charity Grant programmes as detailed below.

Approximately 75% of total charitable expenditure goes to Freemasons and their families when in need, and the remainder to non-masonic charities - on application and after rigorous due diligence and exploration.

donations which also attract GIFT AID. And all donations collected this way are attributed to both the Lodge and the Individual. This is similar to using Gift Aid envelopes but cuts out the laborious part of that process.

In East Lancashire alone, since its formation 7 years ago, the MCF has awarded 1200 Grants, totalling £2.5M supporting vulnerable and disadvantaged freemasons and their families: 200 Grants to support children and young people, 700 grants to relieve financial hardship and over 250 Grants to fund health and medical treatments.

In its first 7 years the MCF has awarded 114 Grants to local charities within East Lancashire totalling almost £1M. In addition to this, charities within the Province have benefitted from the National Strategic Partnerships the MCF has with Age UK, Hospice UK, Home Start **UK and the Cranfield Trust. Overall our Province** consistently receives back more than it gives to the MCF!

Festival Progress

The Pledged Festival total as of 30th April 2023 stands at £1,126,072.

A very big thank you to the hundreds of people signed up for regular payment promises (RPPs) and to all those brethren, wives, Lodges, Chapters and other masonic bodies who have donated so freely to the Festival. Thank you also to all those who are wearing their Festival Jewels with pride.



The truth is though that this figure is the total amount we will raise assuming that all

those signed up for monthly payments by direct debit maintain their payments for the full term of their plan. Currently only 1 in 5 brethren have taken this important step, and we will only be in with a chance of achieving our target (£2.4M) if many more become involved.

We will celebrate our collective achievement at the culmination of the Appeal, the Festival, in late 2026. Our counting end date is December 2027 and so we are now urging brethren and companions to take out new RPPs over 4 years instead of 5, maybe for a slightly higher amount. Whether you can afford £2, £5, £10 or £20 per month matters not; it is the collective regular donations with added Gift Aid that makes a difference.

Since its formation in 2016 the MCF has awarded over 38,000 Grants to support vulnerable or disadvantaged Freemasons or their families. It has also given over 4300 Grants to fund the work of local and national charities that are supporting communities across England and Wales. In total the MCF has given over £120M. This equates to about £50,000 every day

UKRAINE CRISIS APPEAL Together with UGLE, the MCF set up the appeal and within a few weeks Freemasons had raised over £1.1M to support those displaced by the invasion. This money has been dispersed with half going to aid agencies working in Ukraine and Eastern Europe, and half going to UK Charities supporting those who have relocated here seeking safety —often with young children.
